The assistant will meet you at the front door to take your temperature and give you hand sanitizer before entering the office

COVID-19 Screening Questions

- In the last 14 days have you felt feverish or had a fever
- Have you been experiencing any shortness of breath or difficulties breathing?
 - Do you have a cough?
- Have you had any other flu symptoms including gastrointestinal upset, headache, and fatigue?
 - Has you experienced recent loss of taste or smell?
 - Have you been in contact with any confirmed COVID-19 positive patients?
 - Have you traveled outside of Maryland in the last 14 days?
